Memorial service held for Ourida Oubraham

On December 23, 2013, a beloved member of the Stevens community passed away. Her name was Ourida Oubraham and she worked at the Samuel C. Williams Library for thirty years, appointed library director in 2007. To commemorate Oubraham for her achievements and legacy, a memorial service was held last Friday in April 4, 2014 at 11:00 a.m. inside the Great Hall of the Samuel C. Williams Library. Many attendees arrived at the memorial service, including Oubraham's family and friends, faculty across Stevens, and various students who knew her.

Oubraham received a Bachelor of Science in Biology from Algiers University in Algeria, and a Master of Science in Library Science from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. During Ourida's time at Stevens, she actively promoted the library as a vital component of the Stevens experience and was ahead of her time in terms of accepting new technology and looking toward the library's future in how it could better serve students.

Oubraham oversaw improvements in document delivery and the formation of a textbook reserve program, including an increase in study space and the creation of a media room providing resources to help students with preparing presentations. In addition, she encouraged open communication and collaboration between the librarians and the rest of the faculty to ensure

that the teaching and evaluation of information and digital literacy skills continued onward as an important component of student learning. Oubraham also led initiatives to improve the preservation of Stevens' historical treasures and artifacts; and she organized an annual reception to recognize Stevens authors.

Throughout the memorial service, a variety of speakers stepped up to the podium to talk about their experiences with Oubraham, and how she had not only impacted Stevens, but also other people — including her family, friends, students, and coworkers in the library. All the people who took time off work and their schedule to come to the memorial service for Ourida Oubraham each shared a different experience with her, each holding slightly different perspectives of her.

Linda Beninghove, the interim director of the Samuel C. Williams Library, opened up the memorial service with a short speech, followed by Stevens President Nariman Farvardin, who spoke of his experiences with Oubraham and how she spoke with strength and determination about various library projects and saving the history of Stevens. Farvardin then went on to speak about how Oubraham's influence was too profound and that her memories were too vivid. After Farvardin gave his speech, Richard Widdicombe, the retired library director of the Samuel C. Williams Library described

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"A Funny Thing Happened" in DeBaun Auditorium

It's a good thing the Stevens Dramatic Society hosts each of their productions for three nights, because their shows rake in several full houses worth of attendees. And last Thursday, A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum proved no different.

Directed by Tony Spinoso and produced by Michael Cahill, Forum generated a lot of interest when posters bloomed all along walls and entryways, not only for actors but also for musicians, set designers, and hair and makeup artists. The SDS is usually well-stocked with volunteers, but this semester's production gained quite a large turnout. "We almost didn't have room on the bill for all of them," noted the producer. "It was incredible how many people showed up to help put on the show."

And it certainly showed. Though the SDS usually does a pretty good job with the execution of their setup, the look for Forum was exceptional — it almost seemed professional-

grade. The stage in Debaun was transformed into an elaborate agora and the true-to-history traditional Roman garb sent attendees back in time to a simpler era. Or was it?

The plot of Forum centers around Pseudolus, a slave to an elite Roman family comprised of Domina, a practical, no-nonsense noblewoman burdened with keeping the males of the household in check; Senex, a lustful old man; and young Hero, who falls hopelessly in love with Philia, the Cretan virgin living in the brothel next door. While Domina and Senex depart for a lengthy trip, Pseudolus promises Hero that he will pair Philia up with him in exchange for his freedom — a task that proves much more difficult than he anticipated.

Pseudolus arrives at the brothel, owned by the somewhat scatterbrained Marcus Lycus, and asks to make a transaction. Marcus Lycus displays his entire inventory, only to reveal that the virgin Philia is reserved for a famous captain sailing in from Crete. Thus, Pseudolus, with his slave

companion Hysterium, conspire to sneak Philia out of the brothel before his masters and the captain come home.

When Hero and Philia are introduced to each other, each of their airheadedness seems to complement each other quite well, and it seems Pseudolus has his freedom in the bag. But the captain arrives to the village sooner than expected, and demands that his bride be brought to him from the brothel. Lycus is dumbfounded when he comes to the captain empty-handed, and so Pseudolus must devise a tale of her tragic death. This, too, proves tricky, as Philia's wanderous ways have brought attention to her — Senex, having snuck back from a less-than-favorable trip, becomes enamored with the young woman and plans a rendezvous with her, while Hero still vies for her affection. Domina returns shortly after, and has a hunch that Senex is up to no good. She then dresses up as a golden-haired temptress, not at

The best side forward

Sometimes, the clubs even produce products, such as the Stevens Game Development Club and their new "Mr. Game!" product which may hit the market someday soon. There is a niche for everyone, no matter who you are or who you were.

Greek Life: Despite being a technology-centric school, Stevens hardly shies away from this staple college element. There are several social fraternities and sororities, each unique in their own lifestyle and historic background. Many distinguished Stevens Alumni were a part of the fraternal organizations on campus, including the namesake of the Babbio Center, Lawrence

T. Babbio (Delta Tau Delta, Rho Chapter). But Greek Life is not restricted to social fraternities, there are also a couple of cultural fraternities and service fraternities on campus.

Standard College Amenities: So maybe all of the other unique things of Stevens aren't your cup of tea, but you still want to go here. Absolutely fine! It isn't like Stevens is so unlike other colleges and universities out there. The opportunities to grow and develop are here, just as they are at any other college or university. While at Stevens, you are given the chance to expand in ways you could not when in high school. You can purchase food and games for yourself, manage your own time, decide your own schedule and do almost whatever you want to do with your free time. You could join a fraternity, make friends with a club on campus, or study hard to earn a Master's Degree in four years alongside a Bachelor's Degree.

The reality is, whether we see it or not, Stevens is pretty awesome. Of course it has its flaws like its high tuition and cost of living, but that is to be expected, especially because of the voluminous amounts of opportunity here on campus. In my Italian class, one of the focuses that my professor has is showing her students the richest parts of Italian culture. Those of you who read my article last week read about a couple of adventures that I've gone on with my class to see artisans at work throughout Florence. This is but one of the vast differences in culture between Italy and the United States. There are certainly a great many more though!

As one might expect, there is absolutely a difference in fashion, which is not simply on the designer scale. Everyday people, including university students like us, dress to the trends and styles that come and go. Jeans are not as popular as they are in

the States and it is unheard of here to walk around in sweatpants or sneakers, but leather jackets and boots are seen everywhere. People here also just make up their own trends. My theory is that this is what attributes to so many designers being from Europe: there is much

more originality in everyday fashion here.

The Palazzo Pitti Museum here in Florence has what they call a "costume display", which showcases fashion from the time of the Medici family strength in

The Streak is over (and that's okay)

On March 24, 1991, The Undertaker, accompanied by the late Paul Bearer, defeated Jimmy "Superfly" Snuka at WrestleMania VII: this was The Undertaker's first victory and debut at WrestleMania. 22 WrestleManias later, and The Undertaker secured his 21st victory, defeating CM Punk; he was still undefeated. On April 6, 2014, at WrestleMania XXX at the Mercedes-Benz Super Dome in New Orleans, The Undertaker squared off against Brock Lesnar (managed by Paul Heyman) to defend his 21-0 record at WrestleMania, an unprecedented feat that was known by pro wrestling fans of all degrees simply as "The Streak."

There are not many certainties in life, but for fans of professional wrestling, The Streak was one of them. Every year The Undertaker would enter WrestleMania undefeated an walk out undefeated. Whether you were ignorant to the fact that professional wrestling was a "work"

(staged, or predetermined) or knew the ins and outs of the business, there was not a remote chance that anyone believed The Streak would end, especially at WrestleMania XXX. After all, The Streak had remained intact for 21 years; there was no reason to believe it would end, and to a part-time talent like Brock Lesnar no less. To further reiterate this point ad nauseum, The Undertaker's match at WrestleMania was, and by no means to diminish its importance, a spectacle, nothing more. The outcome of the match was universally known by everyone, and there was no way that the feud between The Undertaker and that year's opponents could ever cause any doubt in a fan's mind. As ironic as it is, The Undertaker's matches at WrestleMania were the ones that even a fan who believed the product was a "shoot" (actual fighting) knew were fixed.

In the past five years, The Undertaker has been in some of the greatest matches in WrestleMania history, most notably his contests against Shawn Michaels and Triple H at WrestleMania 25 and 26, and 27 and 28 respectively. Just before this time, about a decade ago, The Streak became the annual certainty that every fan cherished.

Because The Undertaker spans nearly 30 years of professional wrestling, so many people from several generations have experienced "The Deadman" in some fashion, and thus The Streak. Although not doing justice to the legend that is The Undertaker, he and The Streak were a

major component of many people's childhoods, something they remember looking forward to every WrestleMania — it was pure happiness, a celebration. At WrestleMania XXX, nothing different was expected. A gong sounded throughout the arena, the lights turned dark, illuminated by dark blue lights as smoke filled the ground level of the arena; The Undertaker entered the stage in his classic hat and coat, stared at a casket labeled "22" on its top, followed by "Brock Lesnar." With a swift motion, The Undertaker lifted his arm and the casket burst into flames, signifying what everyone believed to be an extension of The Streak, and the demise of Brock Lesnar.

When the match began, The Undertaker was dominating as usual. Midway into the match, Lesnar gained the upper hand and began to beat down "The Phenom." Of course, fans knew how this formula played out. Lesnar would dominate The Undertaker, The Undertaker would keep coming back, an eventually The Undertaker would win despite the odds, proving his resilience, and living up to his name as "The Deadman." After Lesnar hit his finishing move for the second time, the F-5, The Undertaker miraculously kicked out of the pin attempt; fans knew that this was the beginning of the end for Lesnar. Except this time, Lesnar continued to beat down The Undertaker for an extended period of time; this was not the

Did Sherlock Holmes believe in God?

thing a rose is!"

Holmes, whose gargantuan intelligence focuses obsessively on solving crimes (he is interested in science only insofar as it furthers this goal), has never evinced "any keen interest in natural objects," Watson notes. Watson is even more startled when Holmes, after picking up the rose, delivers the following monologue:

"There is nothing in which deduction is so necessary as in religion. It can be built up as an exact science by the reasoner. Our highest assurance of the goodness of Providence seems to me to rest in the flowers. All other things, our powers, our desires, our food, are all really necessary for our existence in the first instance. But this rose is an extra. Its smell and its color are an embellish-

ment of life, not a condition of it. It is only goodness which gives extras, and so I say again that we have much to hope from flowers."

Holmes is alluding to what I call the problem of beauty. The problem of evil—that is, undeserved suffering—prevents me from believing in God, or at least an all-powerful God who gives a damn about us. But the problem of beauty keeps me from being an adamant atheist. If reality results from sheer coincidence, why is it so heartbreakingly lovely? As the great physicist and Nobel laureate Steven Weinberg, an atheist if ever there was one, once wrote, sometimes nature "seems more beautiful than strictly necessary."

My guess is that the hyper-empirical Holmes, if pressed, would say that

he is an agnostic, because there is insufficient evidence for either belief or disbelief in a Creator. Holmes is far more rational than his own creator, Conan Doyle. After the death of his wife and other loved ones, Doyle consoled himself by believing in ghosts.

Toward the end of his life he even insisted on the existence of fairies—you know, tiny winged humanoids, like Peter Pan's pal Tinker Bell. How could an obviously brilliant man fall prey to such a delusion? Now that's a mystery.

Heartbleed: The biggest TLS vulnerability since 2006

website you are trying to browse, and only afterward does it start transmitting the actual web page. However, starting a TLS connection takes a significant amount of time, and can bog down performance. Therefore, it is useful to have a way of keeping a single connection open, and re-using it as necessary. This is where the heartbeat comes in handy.

However, in OpenSSL, which is a widely used implementation of TLS/SSL, the heartbeat extension had a bug. Actually, for the past two years it has had a bug. This bug is not a problem with TLS itself; it is just an issue with OpenSSL, and has since been fixed in the latest release. If a malicious client sends a spe-

cially crafted message to a vulnerable server, this bug allows the client to read from the server's main memory. In practice, this allows attackers to read the private keys used to encrypt and decrypt sensitive information. With a server's private keys, an attacker can impersonate the server, and it can eavesdrop on other people who are browsing that website. This means that emails and passwords can be decrypted. The encryption itself has become useless.

Quoting from the researchers' web page about the vulnerability, "We attacked ourselves from outside, without leaving a trace. Without using any privileged information or credentials we were able to steal from ourselves the

secret keys used for our X.509 certificates, user names and passwords, instant messages, emails and business critical documents and communication." Yahoo! Mail, AdFly, Tor, and numerous other services have been affected by this exploit. Luckily, Google, LastPass, and some other critical websites have not been affected. However, it is recommended that all websites update their OpenSSL installation immediately, and revoke and re-issue all X.509 certificates. If you do not know what this means, do not worry. However, be careful about browsing the Internet this week, and if a website asks you to change your password, do so as soon as possible.



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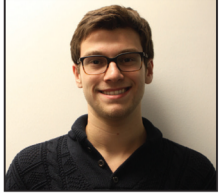

Has GM really improved, or is it the same old?

13 confirmed deaths and 31 front end crashes as a result of the faulty switches.

The problem seems to point at the lead switch engineer, Ray DeGiorgio, who claims under oath that he never approved a change to the ignition switch. Documents have turned up proving he signed off on a replacement part but used the same part number. By not changing the part number, the tracking is made more difficult, and that is unacceptable. There must be a law against that somewhere in the books. Here lies a dilemma, should he face criminal charges? People died because of this faulty

ignition switch. People go to jail for insider trading, is this not worse? Was he told to cover up the problem

by executives higher up in GM? And even if he was, is it not still morally wrong? Should the individuals or

the corporation face charges? There is still so much to learn about this cover up. Many prosecutors claim that it is easier to prosecute a company as opposed to an individual where it has to be proven he is guilty beyond a shadow of a doubt. To date, no one has been fired at GM for the faulty ignition switch problem, and GM has been aware of the problem since at least last January.

Presently, there are some judges who would like to see all the GM cars that need the part changed to be parked until fixed. Some would like to see GM pay for loaner cars for everyone affected until all the

cars are fixed. GM spokespeople have said that drivers simply need to separate or detach the key from heavy key ring holders which can cause the switches to turn from on to off while driving. They claim the cars are safe to drive without the extra weight on the key. Are they serious? How scientific is that? Would you risk your life on the assessment of some heavy or extra weight on the key without more specifics after at least 13 people have already died? This sounds a lot more like the old GM that went bankrupt as opposed to the new GM we were all hoping for.

the fourteenth century to the present day. It was surprising to me that items created only a few years ago are considered history and are displayed here. This goes to show how important fashion is in society here.

Clothing is one way that Italians express themselves. Another, which my Italian professor pointed out, is how they maintain their apartments. This might seem trivial, because most people keep their houses clean, tidy, and overall presentable. There is a whole other level of pristineness in the households here that is actually difficult to explain through writing. It is almost as if living spaces here are not for living in, but for showing off. The traditional living and dining room will only be used when guests are over. Within it, there is furniture that looks like it has not been touched, including a display case for crystal and favors from family gatherings.

Another noticeable difference here is the lack of houses, but many more apartments. It is rare for someone here to own their own house, let alone have any form of a yard or large space like many of us in the States do. It is much more common to have an apartment here, even in small

towns, which costs the same as a full two story house in the States. Often, the only reason that one might have a villa or a large plot of land here is if they have a need for the land, such as for farming.

The language in Italy is also another peculiarity and can be fun to observe in different cities. Each city and region here has its own form of dialect. The closest comparison in the States would be the difference in regional accents, such as the noticeable ones from the south or from the northeast. In Italy however, it's not simply a matter of accents; dialects are almost entirely new languages. Someone who grew up with a Florentine dialect probably wouldn't even be able to understand someone speaking with a Neapolitan accent!

The homework assignments that I've been given in my Italian class here have been quite different from any that I've ever had in the States. The simpler ones have been to watch three movies in Italian with Italian subtitles and to read a book in Italian. The more challenging, but also more fun one, has been to meet with an Italian student who is trying to learn English once a week in order for us to learn each other's languages more fluently. This cultural immersion is definitely one of the best ways to learn another language and culture. For anyone

who is trying to learn another language, I would recommend the same "homework assignments" that I've been given. There are a couple of key lessons from my Italian professor that have helped all of her students in immersing themselves in the Italian language. The first is to stop trying to understand every single little word and accent, but to continue on as long as you understand the general meanings of things. This concept works similarly in reverse: as long as others understand what you are trying to say, continue on speaking the language, because the only way to improve is to use it every day.

Now that I've gotten that piece of life-advice out of the way, I have one last observation about the cultural differences here in Italy. However, this one is definitely specific to Florence. People here just seem more global. It's such a simple statement, but it has made a very large impact during my studies here. It is common to find people who can speak two or more languages in Florence. Outlooks in everyday conversation often include conversation about countries around the world. Many of my professors and classmates are either from another country, or have studied or worked in multiple countries. The general outlook of people here is that we are all in a global world, where our choices and interactions have effects on people everywhere.

typical formula that was expected. When The Undertaker suddenly made a last-ditch effort to come back, it was obvious that The Undertaker would hit the Tombstone Piledriver, pin Lesnar, and extend The Streak to 22-0. Lesnar reversed the Tombstone attempt, hoisting The Undertaker onto his shoulders, pushing his legs off, and driving him into the mat. Based on past years, this was obviously another spot for The Undertaker to kick out of the pin, make his final come back, and exit WrestleMania victorious yet again. However, this time the referee's hand hit the mat three times, and on April 6, 2014 at WrestleMania XXX at the Mercedes-Benz Super Dome in New Orleans, The Streak was broken.

I, like the 75,000 others in the Super Dome, sat in my living room with my two friends, in utter shock and disbelief. (In fact, I still get legitimate chills when I watch the end of the match still.) The emotions that overtook me were not anger at WWE for orchestrating Brock Lesnar to break The Streak. Instead, the same emotions that overwhelmed me as a kid — one who believed what I was seeing was, in fact, real — returned instantaneously. I was shocked;

I was saddened; I was in denial. This was my tenth anniversary of watching WrestleManias live. I witnessed, in person, The Undertaker defeat CM Punk at MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford at WrestleMania 29 (for what would be his last WrestleMania victory). For fake fighting, this was as real as it got. Of course, after being detached from the moment some time, I was able to reflect on the reality of the scenario. The Undertaker losing at WrestleMania XXX allows the 49-year-old legend to retire. He doesn't have to return for one more match; he can literally (no pun intended) rest in peace. In fact, it was revealed the next day that "The Deadman" suffered a severe concussion and was rushed to the hospital following his match. The Streak ending is for the better. Additionally, millions of pro wrestling fans who "gave up this fake stuff" suddenly became interested in the product, and it is no coincidence that WWE put on one of its best shows in years following WrestleMania XXX: it was genius marketing.

As far as Brock Lesnar being "the one" to end The Streak, that makes sense, too. Having a young talent end The Streak puts an immeasurable amount of pressure on that person to live up to the hype, to win over the fans and be a mega star. If that young talent were to fail, then The Streak's demise would

have been wasted. Additionally, if an established active talent were to end it, then The Streak would overshadow his entire career, and that's all it would consist of. With Lesnar, a part-time talent, ending it, Paul Heyman, who is an active talent, can make the most of The Streak. Lesnar is diverse enough with his UFC and NCAA amateur wrestling background to not have The Streak consume his gimmick, for his gimmick is simply "The Beast Incarnate"; and what better way to exemplify being a beast than to have ended The Streak.

WrestleMania XXX and Raw the day after will be remembered forever as two of the most historic days in professional wrestling, period. Not only because Daniel Bryan finally became WWE World Heavyweight Champion, Cesaro won the André the Giant Memorial Battle Royal, and The Streak ended, but because new talent from WWE's developmental system (NXT) are immediately beginning to be integrated into the main shows. The future is bright for WWE, and it starts now. I said at the beginning of 2014 that this year would belong to WWE. With a massively successful launch of the WWE Network, one of the best WrestleManias in history, and a Raw that featured "the stars of tomorrow," there is no doubt in my mind that 2014 will be the best year for WWE in a long time.

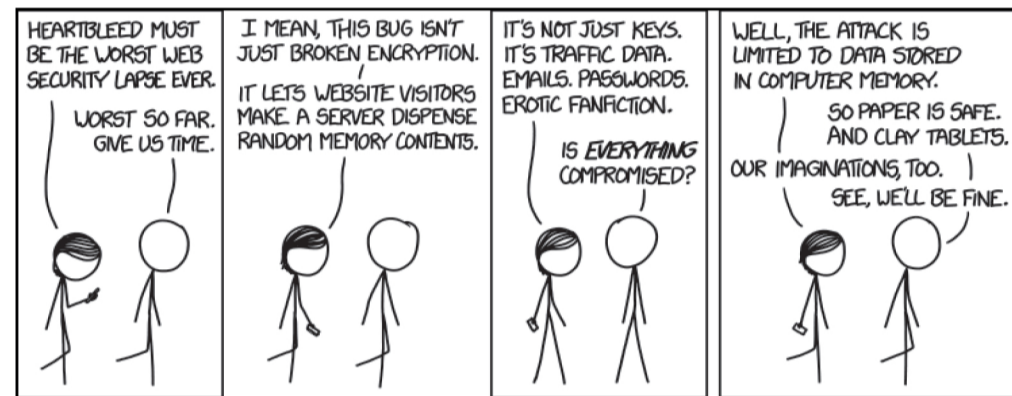

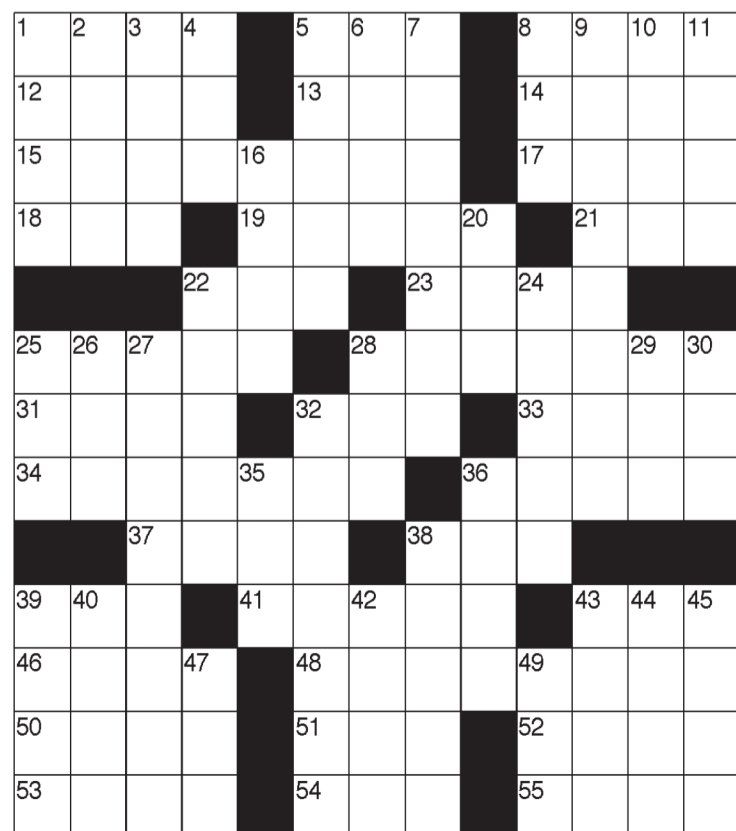

Stevens Chess Club hosts BugHouse Tournament

Pawn to E4. Knight to F6. Bishop to D3. Chess pieces were flying around the board this past Friday, April 4, 2014, as the Chess Club hosted their semesterly bughouse tournament in Babbio 210.

Bughouse is an odd take on the traditional game of chess. Rather than the normal 1 on 1 competition seen in traditional chess, in bughouse, players grab a partner and face off against a pair of opponents. One person on the team plays white, while the other plays black. Every time someone captures an opponent's piece, they hand it to their partner who can then place that piece on their

own board in lieu of a normal move. To make things even more interesting, bughouse is played on a tight clock. Whereas traditional games give each player 20 to 30 minutes to make all their moves, in bughouse, games last only 10 minutes, giving each player only 5 in which to make their own moves.

Round 1 started off fairly quickly, with Brosnan losing to his opponent Shota in less than a minute. He lasted a bit longer the second game, but Shota carried his momentum through and defeated him again to finish off the match with neither of their partners moving more than a few times each game. The other pairs in the tournament looked

to be taking their time compared to Brosnan and Shota, with their games occasionally approaching the time limit.

Maysa and Alex won their match against Ravi and Waldo in a two game series. Shouts for joy could be heard across the room when Alex captured a piece that Maysa then placed to checkmate their opponent. Suketh and Al won their match against TJ and Alexa Haracz, where the confusing bughouse rules caused some trouble for TJ when he found himself facing a check position due to his opponent's placed piece.

Team dynamics are important when it comes to bughouse, unlike in traditional chess

where you have only yourself to rely on. Some teams like to stack their best players board, with the lower ranked of the two players playing cautiously enough survive while focusing on grabbing useful pieces for their partner. Other teams play a blitzkrieg style, where they focus on piece advantage, grabbing every valuable piece while trying to only give up their worse pieces. Eventually, they hope to have an overwhelming board presence on both boards, allowing them the possibility to go for a checkmate on both. Other teams rely upon making fast moves and protecting their king, aiming for their opponents to lose via running out of time,

a resource players are normally short on in bughouse.

The final champions of the tournament were Shota Toraki and Mark Mirtchock, chess clubs resident powerhouses. Shota has been playing chess for as long as he can remember, while Mark has been playing for 16 years under his dad's strict tutelage. Both players were well known in their youth for playing chess. Club President Alex says that they will probably not be permitted to play on the same team in the future, to ensure that other players entering the tournament will have a chance to win. library director of the Samuel C. Williams Library described Oubraham's willingness to plunge right in to using new technology, during the dawn of web search usage. He described his memories of Oubraham always laughing and her ability to win the hearts of other faculty members.

Shortly after, Charles Suffel, Dean of Graduate Academics, explained that Oubraham was a beloved member of the Stevens Community and possessed humility and ability. Suffel also explained that she was a tremendous leader and mentor that can effectively lead in a congenial and passionate manner.

Furthermore, Scott Smith, head of Acquisitions and Collection Development from the Samuel C. Williams Library spoke up about his unique interactions with Oubraham. There was a time in which Oubraham

confided to him and told him that she wished she had planned to skydive and take more risks. This surprised Smith, who expressed that in the two years he had heard that Oubraham was diagnosed with cancer, this was the first time he has ever heard her express any form of regret.

After Scott Smith left the podium, Souhila Yacia, niece of Oubraham, stepped up. In short, she described that she valued her family and that whenever someone asked Oubraham if she was okay, she would always reply, "I'm fine, I could be worse."

Shortly after Yacia finished her speech, Dr. Mojdeh Tabatabaie, close friend of Oubraham and her husband Youcef, stepped up to the podium. Tabatabaie spoke to the audience and summed up his experiences with Oubraham. Towards the end of his speech, he stated that "[Ourida] may not be with us, but her legacy, teaching, and her love is always with us."

At the end of these

speeches given by people who have personally known Oubraham, the audience fell in a heavy silence during the musical interlude as *Dr. Aysegul Durakoglu, Teaching Associate Professor from the Music & Technology and College of Arts & Letters departments played "Nocturne in C minor, op. 48 no. 1 by Frederic Chopin" with the grand piano situated by the entrance of the Great Hall. The calming intense sound of each piano key echoed across the library hall, which caused some curious students studying to stop what they were doing and listen to the music.

As the musical interlude finished, closing remarks about Oubraham were made by Linda Beninghove, who decided to dedicate and restore the "Codex Leicester" to Oubraham. *The Codex Leicester was a work made by Leonardo DaVinci that had only 160 copies printed on handmade paper. The funds for the 1909 edition (copy number 81) of the Codex Leicester

were generously provided by Richard and Michelle Roscitt. In addition to dedicating the Codex Leicester, the Samuel C. Williams Library also plans on picking up where Oubraham left off on her last project to honor her dedication and commitment to the Stevens community. Oubraham's last project involved a feasibility study designed to evaluate the library and propose ideas for improving the use of library space and resources in the future.

After the memorial service closed, the attendees helped themselves to some desserts provided in the service and talked with each other about Oubraham, while some gathered to view the Codex Leicester.

One of the people who recalled Oubraham clearly was Andrew Rifkin, who worked in only one library project with her: "Ourida had a vision for using new technology to improve the library. Even when it was hard to convince people, she found a creative way to convince others to provide

funding for the new iPads and she didn't let anyone stop her when she had a good idea."

Other people at the service commented about their memories of Oubraham, including student Ibrahim Dulijan. "I met her at the third floor [of the library] and I introduced myself to her two years ago as an international student from Saudi Arabia. She greeted me every time she saw me; she recognized my face, and that was how I felt connected to her."

Perhaps the most touching comment of Oubraham's passing came from Linda Beninghove, who worked closely with Oubraham for years. "I am overwhelmed by the kindness shown by the Stevens community - students, faculty, staff, and alumni - who have expressed their deep sadness at the news of Oubraham's passing. The library staff was very touched by the support and caring shown by all who attended the memorial service.

We are so thankful that we could all come together to celebrate the life of our beloved colleague. We are so grateful that Ourida's family and friends were able to travel from near and far to join us for the memorial service. Ourida was very dedicated to her work first as a librarian and then as Deputy Director and Director of the Library. She worked at Stevens for 30 years and always put the needs of students first. She set quite an example and we are honored to have known her and we miss her very much."

Ourida Oubraham has left a legacy felt by all, especially with her family members including but not limited to: Youcef Oubraham, her husband who works as the E-Learning Technologies Administrator and Library Systems Administrator in the IT department of Stevens; and her sons Samir and Sofiane; both of whom have children.

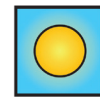

Campus braced for its one of its busiest and, arguably, geekiest days of the year. The Castle Point Anime Convention (CPAC) took center stage on a gorgeous Sunday. Almost all buildings in Lower Campus were booked for use. High-lighting this was the astounding attendance on Sunday morning: the con started at 9:00 A.M., yet the line for registration snaked through the 3rd floor of the MPK (Morton-Pierce-Kidde) complex. Con-goers came in droves to see the headliners, the cosplayers, and the Dealer's Room/Artist's Alley. CPAC is a convention for anime, manga, and Japanese culture that is hosted every Spring by the Stevens Anime Club, and involves numerous on-campus organizations, including WCPR, SITTU, C2GS, and APO.

Having started in 2008, this year's convention is

the club's seventh, and is the biggest yet. According to Anime Club executive board member Tyler Romeo, more than 3,200 people attended, which is 700 more than last year. The stairs starting on 1st floor Morton were split between those who pre-registered through the website and those paying cash the day of. Attendance for Stevens students was free, pre-registration tickets were \$15, and day-of entry was \$20. This fee paid for access to the entire con via a badge, a program, and a map. The convention had numerous events in which attendees could participate. Voice actors Crispin Freeman and Michele Knotz, as well as comedian Ian Rubin and webcomic artist (and Stevens student) Katie Tiedrich made guest appearances. There were also panels, which are organized by outside organizations and covered many different topics. In Schaefer gym was the Artist's Alley and Dealer's room, where artists and vendors loaded in

their equipment and sold artwork and goods to attendees looking to buy. At the end of the convention was CPAC The Dance, which was held in Walker gym by WCPR. And then there's cosplay.

Long considered one of the most both fascinating and repelling sights of CPAC to campus passerbies, cosplay—a portmanteau derived from “costume play”—consists of dressing up as your favorite character and imitating their personality while in costume. For devoted cosplayers, costumes can take months to create. Because listing each and every cosplay found at CPAC would be tedious to reader and writer, the focus here will be on standouts. Popular anime this year were “Homestuck”, “Sword Art Online”, “Kill la Kill”, “Attack on Titan”, “My Little Pony”, and “Adventure Time”. Creatures called “trolls” from “Homestuck” were quite visible on campus, known by many for their dark-blue-painted faces, horns, and shirts with

symbols representing the Zodiac, all contrasting with the bright, sunny weather. Members of the “Survey Corps” from “Attack on Titan”, including protagonist Eren, led an impromptu conga-type of line around MPK lawn numbering at least 75 people. The main character from “Kill la Kill”, Ryuuko, wears a risqué school uniform that was a popular choice this year. The costume choice for those cosplaying “Kill la Kill” was limited, because most recognizable costumes worn would result in an arrest for public indecency. This is especially a problem for those who are high school students and younger. Quite a few couples dressed up as duo Asuna and Kirito from “Sword Art Online”. Also popular were Steampunk-related costumes and cosplayers donning a mysterious monitor head.

To capitalize on the popularity of cosplay, CPAC has many cosplay-related events, the most important of which are the Cosplay Exhibition,

Cosplay Runway, and Cosplay Chess. CPAC advertises the event as “show(ing) off [attendees'] costume and get in character by performing a skit”. They note that unlike the more well-known “Cosplay Masquerade”, they judge neither performances nor costumes. “Cosplay Exhibition” did not promise a good show. Emcee and cosplay department head Anthony Fericola began the event by asking a moderately filled Burcharde 118 for those who had pre-registered for the event to check in. No one who pre-registered ever checked in for the event. This did not stop Fericola from changing the event to “Cosplay Improv”, and soliciting members of the audience to aid him. Notable aides in keeping everyone interested were people cosplaying as Deadpool and Spider Man from Marvel Comics, Rainbow Dash from “My Little Pony: Friendship is Magic”, a Para Para (“a synchronized type of group dance

around since the early 1980s” according to wikipedia) group named IchiP!, and someone dressed as Vocaloid Hatsune Miku. Deadpool, Spider Man, and Rainbow Dash maintained the audience's interest through comedy and impromptu skits. By an audience member's request, the Para Para dance group IchiP! enchanted the crowd with dance moves from J-Pop girl group Morning Musume's “Renai Revolution 21”. The Hatsune Miku cosplayer also danced solo to another song, also entrancing the audience. Many of these acts filled the one-hour gap between Cosplay Exhibition and Cosplay Runway, resulting in a full room for Cosplay Runway and at least 20 enthused cosplayers to set the stage for the next event.

Cosplay Runway and Cosplay Chess are staples of CPAC and do not change much from year to year. Cosplay Runway involves attendees showing off their costumes. Highlights include a fam-

ily dressed as Tsuna, Chrome Dokuro, and Lambo from “Katekyo Hitman Reborn!”, Deadpool from Marvel Comics with two pink ovals under his eyes and a sign saying “Am I Kawaii (cute in Japanese)?” and Allen from D. Gray Man. In Cosplay Chess, an event booked for 3 hours between 11 AM and 2 PM, two CPAC-employed contestants move cosplayers around as chess pieces in a scripted match. When one piece wants to take another, they have a one on one duel in which the piece taking another uses the special move of their character to defeat the other piece. For example, Fionna from “Adventure Time” swung her sword to defeat another character. When it came time for her defeat by a female-version of Link from Zelda, Link ran his sword through her after they circled each other for a few seconds. The match organizers try to keep the game balanced so that as many players as possible got their time in the spot-

light. “This year, setup took less time than usual, with 30 minutes pre-game and the actual match only taking an hour.

Artist’s Alley and Dealer’s Room is the place many a con-goer empty their pockets. Vendors sold various anime/Japan-related paraphernalia, including the infamous Pocky, elaborate fanart of popular anime, replica swords, and figurines of famous characters shipped straight from Japan. One of the more impressive items was a replica of Sora’s keyblade from the “Kingdom Hearts” series. Other impressive items were plushies, which would have been more attractive if not for the \$130 tag. One vendor had an extensive array of anime-related DVDs, selling for around \$40 each. The Pocky was \$4 per box when normal prices indicate a range of \$2 -3 per box. Ramune, a Japanese soda which uses a marble as a stopper and is a staple at conventions, was also overpriced. Luckily, for poorer attendees

seeking food and drink, the Karaoke Café, and vendors in Hoboken had more reasonable prices. As a rule, no photography is allowed in the Dealer’s Room/Artist’s Alley. Another food option, the insanely popular Tenshi no Ai Maid Café—an establishment in which patrons order food and drink served to them by workers dressed in maid outfits, with an emphasis on cuteness—was so in demand that booking a seat was nearly impossible.

Perhaps the most popular event of the convention was the dance. “CPAC: The Dance”, as it’s called, was the concluding event for the convention, and ran from 7pm to 9pm. At last year’s convention, the dance started an hour later at 8pm. According to Tyler Romeo, the dance started earlier in order to “make things easier on high school students and individuals working full-time jobs, [who] make up a significant portion of the attendee demographic”. The dance was set up and

hosted by WCPR, with Staski and DJ Gnaw running the show. Staski is a local DJ, and is also the host of WCPR’s radio show “A State of Dance”. DJ Gnaw has DJed CPAC and other anime conventions previously, and returned this Sunday for another year of bright lights and loud music. The dance concluded with the announcement that Tyler Romeo will be the convention chair for next year’s CPAC.

Overall the convention was extremely popular. 1,384 people pre-registered for the convention, and more than 1,400 paid at the door. Those numbers combined with 200 Stevens students, another 100 volunteers, and all the artists, vendors, panel organizers, and press, there were more than 3,500 people on campus. The convention earned about \$53,000 in revenue, which resulted in a profit of \$22,000 for the anime club. The profit from the convention is fed back into funding the convention for next year.

US warns Russia of tougher sanctions over Ukraine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary Jacob Lew told his Russian counterpart on Thursday that Russia could face tougher economic sanctions because of its actions in Ukraine.

The U.S. Treasury said that Lew warned Russian Finance Minister Anton Siluanov that the United States is prepared to impose “additional significant sanctions” if Russia escalates the Ukraine situation. Treasury said in a statement that Lew described Russia’s annexation of Crimea as “illegal and illegitimate.”

Lew’s discussions with Siluanov came in advance of meetings Thursday of finance officials from the Group of Seven major industrial countries and the Group of 20 nations, which includes the G-7 countries and emerging economies such as China, Brazil and India.

Russia is a member of the G-20 but not the G-7. The G-7 nations are the United States, Japan, Germany, Britain, France, Canada and Italy.

It was unclear how much support the United States would receive from other countries to strengthen the sanctions imposed on Russia.

French Finance Minister Michel Sapin told reporters before the discussions that France preferred to focus on the economic support being provided to Ukraine. That effort is being led by the International Monetary Fund,

which says it will provide up to \$18 billion in loan guarantees to Kiev to help the country get its economy moving again.

“The question is not to talk about sanctions. The question is to get started ... as quickly as possible” working to get the IMF’s support program implemented.

The U.S. delegation to the G-7 and G-20 talks was led by Lew and Federal Reserve Chair Janet Yellen.

A G-20 dinner Thursday

night was scheduled to begin with a tribute to former Canadian Finance Minister Jim Flaherty, who took the Cabinet position in 2006, was the longest-serving G-7 finance minister before he announced three weeks ago that he was stepping down. A friend said he had died of a massive heart attack.

The G-20 talks were scheduled to wrap up Friday with news conferences from many of the participating nations. Then on Saturday, the

policy-setting councils of the 188-nation IMF and its sister lending organization, the World Bank, were to hold their spring meetings.

On Thursday, IMF Managing Director Christine Lagarde said the global economy was finally turning the corner after a deep recession but the recovery remains too weak.

Speaking at a news conference, Lagarde called on governments to aggressively pursue programs to spur economic growth to help the

millions of people who remain unemployed.

“Bold actions are need to generate stronger growth,” Lagarde told reporters.

The discussions on how to boost growth and fight poverty were likely to be overshadowed at the meetings by the rising tensions over Russia’s actions in Ukraine.

The United States and European nations have imposed various economic sanctions on Russia including travel bans and asset

freezes in response to Russia’s annexation of Crimea, with the possibility of tougher sanctions on the table.

To provide support for Ukraine’s cash-strapped government, the IMF is working up a loan package to provide between \$14 billion to \$18 billion in assistance.

However, Russian President Vladimir Putin has threatened to demand advance payment from Ukraine for natural gas that Russia supplies to the country.

Asked Thursday about the IMF support, Lagarde said the IMF hoped to have the program for Ukraine approved by its 24-member board by the end of this month or early May.

Foreign ministers from the 28-nation European Union are scheduled to meet in Brussels on Monday and the issue of expanding the sanctions will be discussed. However, some countries have already expressed opposition to such a move.

World Bank President Jim Young Kim told reporters at a separate news conference that the sanctions that have already been imposed were having a dampening effect on Russia’s economy and if the crisis worsens, he said Russia could be pushed into a recession.

Kim said that the World Bank was preparing its own support package for Ukraine amounting to around \$3.5 billion.

Feds: ‘Excessive force’ used by Albuquerque police

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — A scathing report by the U.S. Justice Department released Thursday revealed a troubling pattern of excessive force by the Albuquerque Police Department and recommended that New Mexico’s largest city become the latest municipality to adopt reforms aimed at cleaning up its police force.

The report, which immediately drew support from Albuquerque Mayor Richard Berry and other city officials, came after federal officials spent months conducting interviews, scouring videos and reviewing hundreds of pages of documents. According to the report, Albuquerque officers too frequently used deadly force on people who posed a minimal threat and used a higher level of force too often on those with mental illness, often violating their constitutional rights.

Albuquerque joins a list of cities targeted by the Justice Department over allegations of brutality and violations of constitutional rights by police officers. Portland and New Orleans, for example, are among those that have been investigated amid similar complaints.

In Albuquerque, federal investigators focused on 37 shootings — 23 of them fatal — by officers since 2010. By comparison, police in the similarly sized cities of Denver and Oakland have been involved in fatal and non-fatal shootings totaling 27 and 23, respectively.

Federal investigators found the majority of those Albuquerque shootings were unreasonable and violated constitutional rights. They also uncovered a significant number of instances in which officers used less lethal measures such as Tasers in an unconstitutional

manner.

“Based on our investigation, we have reasonable cause to believe that APD engages in a pattern or practice of use of excessive force, including deadly force, in violation of the Fourth Amendment,” Jocelyn Samuels, the acting assistant attorney general of the Justice Department’s civil rights division, wrote in a letter to Berry. “We have determined that structural and systemic deficiencies — including insufficient oversight, inadequate training, and ineffective policies — contribute to the use of unreasonable force.”

The Justice Department recommended that Albuquerque make changes to its use of force policy to, among other things, place more emphasis on techniques for de-escalating potentially violent situations.

Samuels said the investigation was thorough and that it became clear the problems within the police department were systemic.

“The reforms we are proposing ... are going to result in the kinds of structures that will over time create a change in the culture,” she said. “It starts with commitment from the top.”

She acknowledged that changes will not happen overnight.

The findings served as validation for critics who have long complained that a culture of aggression has permeated the Albuquerque Police Department. However, some community members voiced concerns after Thursday’s announcement that recommendations have been made in the past with city leaders failing to take action.

Berry said the city stands ready to work with the Justice Department to make needed changes.

It could take weeks to hammer out the final blueprint for overhauling the Police Department, but Berry said he fully expects that a federal monitor will be assigned to the city.

“It won’t be quick and easy, but we can achieve it,” he said of the goals laid out by the Justice Department report.

If a federal monitor is appointed, and the city agrees on terms, Albuquerque would join cities such as Detroit, Los Angeles, New Orleans and Seattle that have been subjected to federal oversight.

Scrutiny of the Albuquerque force is one of 15 investigations of police departments launched during President Barack Obama’s first term.

The Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 gives the Justice Department the authority to file a civil suit against law enforcement agencies that engage in a pattern or practice of misconduct. The

law was enacted after Los Angeles police officers beat motorist Rodney King in 1991.

The Justice Department also can sue law enforcement agencies if they engage in discrimination and receive federal funds.

Samuels did not offer a timetable for negotiations with Albuquerque, but said the agency would remain engaged for “as long as is necessary.”

Last week, Berry asked the federal agency to expedite its review and help overhaul the police force. His request followed a violent protest last month in response to the shooting death of a homeless man who had threatened to kill officers. The man was gathering his belongings and turning away when officers opened fire, helmet camera video showed.

The Justice Department recommendations also call for a more objective and rigorous internal accountability system that includes reviews

and investigations when force is used.

Also, officers would be required to participate in crisis intervention training and higher eligibility standards would be set for supervisors and staff assigned to tactical units.

Samuels also noted that the department’s “broken” civilian oversight process would need to be fixed.

Until Thursday’s announcement, federal officials released few details of the Albuquerque investigation but conducted hundreds of interviews with officials and residents.

Jewel Hall, a retired teacher and president of the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Center Board, participated in many of the meetings. She said she was hopeful the department would adopt some of the recommendations. Her group said the Justice Department recommendations didn’t go far enough and called for a “full-fledged monitor” of Albuquerque

police.

Still, she said the community “needs to be involved and their input needs to be respected.”

New Mexico’s acting U.S. Attorney, Damon Martinez, called Thursday a milestone for the city.

“The coming days and months will determine the next generation of what policing will look like in our city,” he said. “We are at a unique time and place where the city can decisively determine the culture of the Albuquerque Police Department and its relationship with the community.”

In a statement, the Albuquerque Police Officers’ Association said the union appreciated the changes recommended by the Justice Department. “We as an association are committed to assisting all of our officers’ in this (department of addressing issues of concern that have been raised and helping them move forward in a positive fashion that is fair to all.”

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Investors flee tech stocks again, pummeling Nasdaq

NEW YORK (AP) — The high-flyers are laying the stock market low — once again.

Investors turned against biotech, Internet and other once-soaring stocks on Thursday, driving the Nasdaq composite index to its worst day since 2011.

The sell-off in tech names dragged down the broader market and left all the major U.S. indexes in the red for the year.

Steep declines in tech, followed by rebounds, have become a familiar pattern in the stock market in recent weeks. After falling Monday, the Nasdaq and other major index rallied over the next two days. On Thursday, stocks dropped again, led once more by biotech and technology companies.

The slide represents a shift in investor psychology. After chasing their huge gains in 2013, investors are worried that stocks like Facebook and Gilead Sciences, which doubled last year, have become too expensive.

And it's not just lofty prices that have made those sectors volatile in recent weeks. Regulators are scrutinizing the cost of cutting-edge biotech drugs. Worried investors are shifting from riskier investments to safer areas like utilities, health care and consumer staples.

On Thursday, the Nasdaq composite index fell 3 percent, its worst drop since November 2011.

Few companies escaped the downdraft. Of the Nasdaq's 100 largest stocks, only one, C.H. Robinson Worldwide, a freight company, ended higher.

Several factors likely combined to send stocks lower, said Randy Frederick, manag-

ing director of trading and derivatives at Schwab Center for Financial Research.

Frederick said that recent IPOs, many of them tech and biotech companies, have become overheated. At the same time, the market hasn't had a 10 percent decline since the spring of 2012, only smaller dips in the 4 percent and 5 percent range.

"We've been due," Frederick said. "We haven't really had a good catalyst for one, but the quarter's over, we have an earnings season, we have some stocks that are a little overheated, there's just a lot of small negatives that are sort of piling together and creating this confluence of anxiety."

The Nasdaq ended the day down 129.79 points to 4,054.11. It is now down 7 percent from its recent high reached March 5. Other major index also fell, but not as much.

The Standard & Poor's 500

index dropped 39.10 points to close at 1,838.08. It is now down 2.09 percent for the year, although it still remains close to its all-time reached April 2. The Dow Jones industrial average lost 266.96 points to 16,170.22. It is off 1.6 percent for 2014.

Gilead Sciences slid \$5.17, or 7 percent, to \$65.48 on Thursday. Biogen Idec dropped \$13.33, or 4 percent, to \$287.35.

Frederick said it made sense that former high-flyers like biotech would have the biggest drops "because that's where the risk money is, and when people get a little spooked, they're going to pull out of that."

The market's drop wiped out gains made earlier in the week. On Wednesday, minutes from the Federal Reserve's latest meeting reassured investors that the central bank wasn't in a hurry to raise interest rates. The S&P 500 had its

best day in a month.

The index remains near its record high. Stocks had a huge run-up in 2013, and are in the sixth year of a bull market.

The rally in stock prices has been driven, in part, by the Fed's commitment to record-low interest rates. In recent years, the Fed has aggressively bought bonds to hold down borrowing rates and accelerate spending, investing and hiring. It's also kept its benchmark short-term rate near zero. The Fed's supporters say low rates have helped nourish a still-modest economic rebound.

By artificially depressing bond yields, the Fed led more investors to shift money into stocks. Some have argued that the Fed-engineered rates produced an economic sugar high that has lifted stocks too much.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury note dipped to 2.63 percent from 2.69 percent late Wednesday.

News in Brief

Crocodile caught wandering around California mall

ROSEVILLE, Calif. (AP) — Don't shed any tears for a crocodile that was captured wandering outside a pet store at a Northern California shopping mall.

California Fish and Wildlife officials have taken custody of the croc, are feeding it rainbow trout and will likely donate it to a zoo.

Police say the crocodile was apparently left outside the Roseville store by someone who didn't want it anymore.

The animal had grown to 4-feet long, and its jaws had been wrapped shut with heavy-duty tape. There was a note identifying it as a Nile crocodile and requesting someone "call rescue."

Police say no one was hurt Wednesday when the animal was picked up with the help of a catch pole typically used to nab stray dogs.

Woman complains to police about marijuana quality

LUFKIN, Texas (AP) — Police in East Texas have arrested a woman after she called them to complain about the quality of the marijuana she had purchased from a dealer.

Lufkin police Sgt. David Casper said Monday that an officer went to the home of 37-year-old Evelyn Hamilton to hear her complaint that the dealer refused to return her money after she objected that the drug was substandard.

Casper says she pulled the small amount of marijuana from her bra when the officer asked if she still had it.

She was arrested Friday on a charge of possession of drug paraphernalia.

Hamilton said Monday that she spent \$40 on "seeds and residue." She says she called police when she got no satisfaction from the dealer's family.


Tree trimmer hospitalized with chain saw in neck


DOVER, N.H. (AP) — Mike Witonis got an email from Apple thanking him for calling customer service about his laptop computer. Problem is, someone had stolen it from him a year earlier.

Police eventually arrested 24-year-old Casey Wentworth of Portsmouth on Monday and charged him with burglary. He's accused of taking the laptop from Witonis' home in Dover in February 2013.

When the break-in happened, police said they couldn't identify any suspects. Detectives contacted Apple and the laptop's serial number was flagged.

When Witonis got the email, he contacted police, who said the person who called customer service used the serial number of the stolen computer.

Sandone pitched a scoreless sixth and gave up one in the seventh, but the runs were plenty as the junior hurler stranded six runners en-route to her eighth win of the year.

Sellitti led the team offensively with three RBIs off two hits, while DeGennaro and Spitz also contributed three hits each. Risman-Jones tied Sellitti with a game-high two runs scored.

The Ducks started their bats early with DeFeo and Sellitti singling to start the game. After DeGennaro moved both runners up

with a groundout, freshman Jessica Rees hit a sacrifice fly to score DeFeo. Spitz followed suit with a single before junior Noelle Mulligan drove-in two with a double to give Stevens an early 3-0 lead.

Houghton came back with one run in their half of the inning when junior Sarah Beime grounded-out to score freshman Bailey Shattell, but it would be all the Highlanders would be able to muster off junior Meagan Lorenz.

Lorenz retired the side in order in the second before freshman Kelly Klewicki singled home two in the third to extend the lead to five. Lorenz came right back with a one-two-three inning in the third, allowing Stevens to break the game open in the fourth.

With the bases loaded and no-outs, DeGennaro smacked a double to score all three runners, then moved to third and later scored off a
